

## School Values











Our **RAPID** values were designed in partnership with the school community and are foundational in how we behave and learn successfully at school.

The school values reflect the inclusion, diversity and high standards that we set for all our tamariki. We know that positive interaction and engagement with students is a prerequisite for improving achievement and behaviour.

## School Houses

Our school houses celebrate influential New Zealanders: Te Puea, Snell, Sheppard, Hillary and Rutherford.

Houses create a sense of belonging and healthy and fun competition. Students are placed into a house when they start with the school. Students compete in their houses in a range of activities including sports, team relays, haka, house chants and quizzes. Houses include students from years 9 to 13, providing an opportunity for senior students to take on leadership and mentoring roles with younger students.



# Supporting and Growing our Students

As a school we have a strong focus on student wellbeing, positive relationships and supporting our students to become the best versions of themselves. We provide a range of support, career and leadership opportunities to enable students to succeed.

## Student Support

### Dedicated year level class

Students have a dedicated Hauora form class with students from their year level and usually stay with the same Hauora teacher and Dean for the full five years. This fosters strong positive relationships as students move through the school years.

### Peer support programme

All year 9 students are buddied with a year 12 student as part of the peer support programme, helping to support their transition into high school.

As part of the Hauora programme, peer support leaders work alongside year 9 students utilising EndorseMe – a digital work-readiness tool that helps young people identify, develop and record real skills for the real world.

## Careers Centre

Our careers centre provides students with information and support on taking their next steps after secondary school, including education and job-seeking.

Students can drop in during lunchtimes or organise a one-on-one consultation by appointment.

### Our centre provides students with access to the following services:

- One-on-one career consultation
- Career taster courses
- Gateway work experience placements
- Access to enrolment in level 1 university papers (from all New Zealand universities)
- Information and advice on study options including subject selection for university, polytechnic and te wānanga
- Information on apprenticeships
- Information on jobs including job market data
- Short courses in a range of interest areas that include NCEA unit standard credits
- Technical and vocational education and training (TVET) timetabled classes to match students' vocational requirements and obtain NCEA unit standard credits



# Health and Wellbeing

## Health clinic

Students can visit our on-site health clinic to receive care from our registered nurses if they become unwell or injured at school.

Our registered nurses can also offer advice and health information including mental and emotional health. A doctor and physiotherapist visit the health clinic at designated times each week.

## Guidance counselling

Guidance counsellors are available for confidential counselling services with students upon student request or referral by teachers or parents. Our counsellors are trained members of the New Zealand Association of Counsellors.



# Student Leadership

We are committed to providing leadership opportunities for our students to help them develop leadership skills for the future.

The student body is led by four head students, and the house system is led by house captains. These students work with staff (including the Principal and Board of Trustees) on behalf of all students to raise issues and concerns.

Our leadership opportunities reflect the range of interests of our students, and students of all ages are encouraged to participate. Students can join committees, chaired by students, across the school in arts, culture, environment, events, Maaori, sport and Toiora.

Our school leaders are also invited to participate in external leadership programmes.

# Health and Wellbeing: Hauora

Our school-wide Hauora programme is based on the Maaori philosophy of health and wellbeing. Hauora is inextricably linked to all elements of life, including employment, family, social and economic outcomes.

Our Hauora programme aims to build relationships and connections, enhance identity and self-worth, promote help-seeking, build connections to school, strengthen hauora and develop life skills.

## About Hauora

Our Hauora programme is focused around the concept of Te Whare Tapa Wha, which is made up of four pillars that together are hauora.

Taha tinana: **Physical wellbeing**

Taha hinengaro: **Mental and emotional wellbeing**

Taha whanau: **Social wellbeing**

Taha wairua: **Spiritual wellbeing**

Students participate in Hauora activities for 80 minutes across the week. These include topics such as financial literacy, school spirit, work readiness, goal setting and future pathways.

## A Sense of Belonging

Hauora is connected to our school-wide activities which provide a sense of belonging and connection such as our house chant, sports competitions, arts week, diversity weeks and Haka practice. Students are encouraged to take on leadership opportunities so they can role-model the values of the school and contribute to the wider community.

As a school, we are continuously investing in the Hauora programme through the upskilling of staff to ensure that the programme provides value to students.

## Why Hauora

Through the Hauora Programme, we are seeking to address the concerns raised as part of the Waikato Wellbeing Project and the Youth2000 survey, and to respond to the needs of our school community.

The Waikato Wellbeing project aims to have all young people engaged, thriving, and learning or earning a livelihood.

Throughout the year, Hauora teachers conduct Hauora conversations with students to discuss their individual journey through school, highlight any potential barriers to engagement and celebrate successes. These conversations aim to empower students to seek help, build relationships and aid decision-making.

# Learning, Curriculum, NCEA

Our learning curriculum offers a comprehensive range of opportunities for all our students, both inside and outside the classroom.

Hillcrest High School is proud of the exceptionally high standard of academic, cultural and sporting excellence achieved by our students.

Teaching and learning are the cornerstones of our school. Our curriculum meets the needs, abilities and aspirations of our students. Our focus on multi-level study gives students more flexibility to select their level of learning.

We have designed a broad-based curriculum for junior students which provides a range of learning opportunities and enables us to cater for individual subject choices and learning needs as much as possible. The senior school programme allows students to specialise in their areas of interests and strengths.

## NCEA

Academic success is a key feature of our school, with many students gaining Merit and Excellence endorsements at all levels of NCEA. We are also proud of the consistently high number of students who gain NCEA Scholarship, placing them in the top 3 percent in New Zealand. Several of our students have gained Top Scholar Subject Awards and Premier Awards.

Our focus is on maintaining the academic rigour of NCEA and ensuring that students obtain meaningful qualifications that lead to the next level of learning and provide a positive and productive pathway for the future.

We have programmes in place to help identify and support students who are at risk of not achieving their NCEA to ensure they are well supported to be successful.

Senior school programmes are tailored to individual students, including multi-level NCEA courses which allow students to take the Level 1, 2 or 3 courses appropriate for them – regardless of their year level.



## Junior Curriculum

Our junior curriculum provides a broad base for students with subjects including maths, English, science, social studies, arts, health and physical education, languages, technology and digital technologies. Our student-centred curriculum enables students to select the subjects that suit them best.


Arts subjects: Art, drama and music

Language subjects: Maaori, French, Spanish, Japanese and Mandarin Chinese

Technology subjects: Food technology, electronics, design and visual communication, digital technology programming and digital technology media, materials fabrics, materials metal and materials wood

## Senior Curriculum

All students must enrol in a full-time programme of study which includes five NCEA subjects. Some students may take six subjects. Compulsory subjects are English (NCEA Levels 1 and 2), mathematics (NCEA Level 1) and physical education (years 11 and 12).



## Enrichment and Extension

We provide a wide range of extension and enrichment opportunities at all levels of study. This is a key part of our school's curriculum.



### Junior Enrichment and Extension Programme (JEEP)

Year 9 and 10 students who excel academically can participate in the Junior Extension and Enrichment Programme (JEEP). JEEP offers students opportunities to enrich and deepen their thinking and learning through inquiry-driven activities and experiences, both inside and outside the classroom. Experiences include trips to the international film festival, live performance, exhibitions, tours of thought-provoking places and physical challenges.

### Sports development

Year 9 and 10 students can extend their sporting capabilities through our sports development programmes. These programmes support students to learn skills and develop attitudes that will shape them into sportspeople and sports leaders of the future.

### Senior enrichment and extension

Senior students are encouraged to explore and develop their strengths through our enrichment and extension initiatives.

#### Year 12

- Cambridge AS level is available for students in English and mathematics.
- Computer programming students can enter for the University of Waikato Computer Science Scholarship.

#### Year 13

- Eligible year 13 students can choose to study first-year university papers.
- Opportunities are available to participate in national and international competitions.

# Education Outside the Classroom

## Year 10 Great Barrier Experience

We are the only public school in Hamilton to deliver an outdoor education course. Delivered in partnership with the Sir Edmund Hillary Outdoor Pursuits Centre of New Zealand, our programme for year 10 students promotes teamwork, confidence and leadership.

The programme runs over either four or five weeks on Great Barrier Island or Tongariro. The course is device-free and students are encouraged to write letters home.

While the focus is on the outdoors, English, maths, social studies and science are integrated into the programme. Students also participate in projects with the Department of Conservation and undertake a localised pest eradication programme.

### Activities include:

- Sea kayaking
- Canadian canoeing
- Rafting
- Caving
- Tramping
- Rock climbing
- Abseiling
- Navigation
- Camp craft
- High ropes
- Food preparation for the group



Girls' and boys' courses are delivered separately under the guidance of two school teachers and three or four expert instructors from the Hillary Outdoors Education Centre, alongside additional centre staff.

The programme culminates in a graduation at which students share aspects of their personal and educational growth and development gained through the course.

## School Trips

Local, national and international trips are available to extend learning opportunities for our students. Education outside the classroom provides students with real-life learning experiences that contextualise learning gained inside the classroom.

### Opportunities include:

- Year 9 overnight Marae Noho at Te Iti o Haua Marae in Tauwhare.
- Year 10 Great Barrier Island Experience.
- International trips for senior students. Previous trips have included Vietnam for social science, NASA for science, Argentina and Spain for Spanish students, and New Caledonia for French students.





## Janet Guo

### Year 13

"Supportive, diverse, comforting, exciting, community." These are the words year 13 student Janet Guo uses to describe Hillcrest High School.

Janet joined Hillcrest from Fairfield Intermediate and says one of the aspects she enjoys most about the school is the "opportunities available".

Janet's diverse school portfolio includes service captain, debate team captain, Lion dance leader, biology Olympiad team, the SAGE science initiative and Shakespeare. She enjoys giving back to the school and community through these roles and seeing the change and potential impact.

In year 12 Janet achieved the Premier Scholar Award, including top in New Zealand for classical studies.

Her advice to new students is take advantage of all the opportunities and resources available.

Hayley joined Hillcrest from Berkley Normal Middle School. She says she loves being a head student and being a voice of her peers. "I really enjoy leading the SSL team. I'm an organiser and a do-er and love being busy, and this job fulfils both of those things for me."

Hayley's advice to new students is "Don't be afraid to get involved in things you are interested in, no matter how out of the box they may be, or how scared you may be to give it a go! By being brave and trying new things, you may find a new passion you never expected to enjoy!"

Haley describes Hillcrest High School as a place with "great people and modern perspectives". After finishing high school, she plans to attend university to study either computer science or mathematics.

# Inclusive Learning

We focus on creating an inclusive learning environment in which all students can succeed. Our programmes and initiatives are designed to identify students who need additional support, and ensure they have the resources to do their best.

## Rainbow Youth

We are committed to fostering a learning environment where all students can be themselves and thrive. The student-led Skittles Group supports our LGBTQ+ youth, and organises activities throughout the year, including celebrating Pride Week.



## Physical and Intellectual Learning Assistance

All students of the Physical Assistance Centre and Independent Living Centre have individualised education programmes (IEPs) which are developed in conjunction with parents/whaanau, teachers and support staff. All programmes are based on the NZ curriculum with added emphasis on key competencies and school values.



## Physical Assistance Centre and Independent Living Centre

The Physical Assistance Centre (PAC) and Independent Living Centre (ILC) are two departments within the school that provide support services for students with significant physical and intellectual disabilities.

The aim of the PAC and ILC are to enable students to have a fully mainstream academic and extra-curricular education experience, relevant to their abilities. Students are supported to participate in school life, work experience and cultural activities. The centres are funded by the Ongoing and Reviewable Scheme (ORS). Students are part of the mainstream learning classes with targeted funding-providing teacher time, teacher aid support and therapist and specialist support as needed to ensure students have access to our curriculum.



## Learning Support

Learning support is provided to all students, however we place a particular focus on ensuring our year 9 and 10 students are equipped with skills to self-manage while building their confidence and independence, to prepare them for the years ahead.

Where required, teacher aide support is provided in classes to assist multiple students in a discreet manner to support their achievement.



## English Language Learning

A comprehensive English Language Learning support programme is available for students for whom English is not their first language. Programmes are offered at foundation, beginner and junior levels. English Language is also offered at NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3.

Our programmes are run by qualified English Language Learning teachers and teacher aides, who work alongside small groups of students in their main classes.

## Maaori Students

At Hillcrest High school we understand that Maaori succeeding as Maaori is important and an integral component of the growth and development of our rangatahi. We focus on providing a culturally responsive school community and classroom to eliminate barriers to learning.

#### We want our Maaori students to:

- have a sense of belonging: Tuarangawaewae
- be culturally strong and stand with confidence and competence: Kia tuu maaia
- be successful and proud to be Maaori, representing their whaanau and culture: Kia maatau Maaori.

Our Te Reo Maaori department offers further learning in Waikato Reo me ona Tikanga. Various programmes are provided to encourage, support, mentor and give leadership opportunities for students to participate in, including our annual year 9 Tauwhare Marae Noho.

These noho are an integral part of our year 9 programme, assisting in the whakawhanaungatanga of our students with each other and our mana whenua.


## Pasikifa

**Bula Vinaka, Kia orana, Talofa lava, Malo e lelei, Fakaalofa lahi atu and warm Pacific greetings.**

Approximately 5 percent of Hillcrest High students identify as Pacific. Students are well represented in our academic and cultural achievements, leadership roles in the school and participation in our competitive sports teams.

The Talents of the Pacific Academy (TOPA) are actively involved with teaching and mentoring of cultural competencies, with dance students able to gain credits towards Levels 1, 2, and 3. Music credits are also available.

Additional opportunities for students include Pasifika Camp, participation in Pasifika by Nature Cultural Festival 'Power Up', and subject-specific mentoring.



# Extra-Curricular Activities

Extra-curricular activities play a large role in the school experience for students, and help to foster social development, connection and health and wellbeing.

At Hillcrest we provide a wide range of extra-curricular activities and student clubs that reflect the interests of our diverse student body. If your student has an interest that is not offered we can generally help them to set this up through the school.




Drama can help students develop practical, people and personal skills. They learn to be a valued member of the creative community, develop their strengths and take their talents into a real-world context.

We aim to create and inspire confident, reflective and vital members of our society who can apply their skills in any career.

## Music

The music department is extremely well-resourced with industry standard technology. Music as a subject focuses on growing musical discipline and knowledge. Students are encouraged to self-lead their studies to explore aspects of music that interest them and broaden their understanding of different genres.

# Subject Focus: Sports and Physical Activity

Hillcrest High School has a proud sporting history with a wide range of sports on offer for students. We believe that sport is more than just a physical and mental game. Sport helps students to foster interpersonal skills, emotional confidence and social skills.

**Our sports strategy, *Raising our Game*, sets out our commitment to:**

- growing and improving our sport offering
- ensuring we have the resources to support optimum participation
- ensuring programmes are well-balanced and suit the interests of all our students.

This strategy places a greater focus on developing programmes that foster healthy minds and healthy bodies, and promoting awareness of physical movement, being fit and building resilience. Our goal is to produce students who are equipped with the skills for success, both within and outside of sport.

## Participation Growth

We believe sport is a vehicle to developing the core values of a successful life. Our goal is to increase and exceed our current strong targets of sports participation to 60 percent, which is 10 percent above the national average and 5 percent above the regional average.

## Tier One Sports

We have identified 5 sports that we will become renowned for, and in which we will focus on lifting performance and participation. We have dedicated additional support and coaching expertise to grow performance and participation and develop pathways in these sports.

## Youth Athlete Development

Created and led by a specialist strength and conditioning coach, our new Youth Athlete Development programme is designed to enhance athletic capabilities in a safe, structured and monitored environment. The programme includes recovery sessions, group conditioning sessions, injury prevention, rehab, mobility and flexibility.

## Holistic Health and Wellbeing

At Hillcrest High School we promote health and wellbeing, while fostering a lifelong love for physical activity.

Our programmes encourage holistic wellbeing and include topics such as food as fuel, hydration, sleep, energy, resilience, grit and social connections, alongside developing physical capacities.

We recognise the alarming New Zealand rates of mental health issues and youth suicide. As a school, we aim to tackle these real issues through education, awareness and action. We believe in creating meaningful sporting programmes for students to enjoy and grow within. Sport is a wonderful vehicle for developing quality values, which has a positive effect on health and wellbeing for all.

## House Sports

House pride at Hillcrest is strong. Our house sports competitions play a pivotal role in showcasing sport in a positive light and increasing sports participation. A sense of belonging as a house group whaanau is an important part of school life that we continue to grow.



# School and Community

At Hillcrest High School, community and school go hand in hand. We want all our students to be proud students of Hillcrest, and to be easily identified in the community. Our community including parents, caregivers and whaanau are an important voice in our school and students' achievements.

## Uniform

All students in years 9 - 12 are expected to wear the correct school uniform each day, including to and from school or when representing the school at a community or sporting event. Year 13 students wear their own clothing but must always maintain a clean and tidy standard of dress.

Students have a separate uniform for all physical education classes and activities. Sports uniforms are provided by the school.



## Stationery and Devices

Students use digital devices to complete their school learning and homework. A Chromebook or laptop which students can take between school and home is highly recommended to help support and enhance learning.

The use of digital devices to complement traditional learning strategies ensures that students develop their digital literacy and fluency skills and will have the skills, tools and confidence for the workplace and future learning. Stationery lists are available online for each year level and additional learning materials may be required for different courses.

## Canteen

Our school canteen (run by a local family) provides a range of healthy and affordable food options for students. The canteen is open before school with free breakfast available, and at interval and lunch.

## Parent/Caregiver and Community Involvement

At Hillcrest we value the role our whaanau plays in supporting our rangitahi towards a future of success. Communication between home and school is key. We recognise that as parents and mentors, our own learning is critical, as we develop and adapt to life's challenges and those of our rangitahi. We connect and partner with our families and communities, working together to support our students.

## Parent and School Communication

Communication between home and school is key to helping students get the most out of their education and experience at school. We use a range of communication channels to stay connected with parents and whaanau.

If we need to communicate about your child at an individual level, our staff will make direct contact by phone or email.

We use the Hillcrest High School website, Facebook page and regular email newsletters to keep parents and whaanau up-to-date with school events, activities and news.

Our student management system Kamar enables you to check your child's attendance, financials and assessment results.

Our learning management system Schoology enables you to follow your child's learning and view live reporting and feedback comments.

## Meetings and Community Connection

Each term, a meeting is held with our Maaori community and whanau. Each meeting has a unique theme of focus.

Our relationship with Ngaati Hauaa has strengthened through our collaboration in writing a Treaty of Waitangi Policy and Memorandum of Understanding to construct a Wharenui on our school site.

Our relationship with Pasifika families is reinforced through Fono, Pasifika Camp and participating in the Pasifika by Nature Festival.


